#### MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL DELIVERED AT OUR SCHOOL ASSEMBLY TODAY

The Year 6 parents Special guests, families, friends, students and staff today awards will be presented to students who have achieved academic, cultural and sporting excellence, given outstanding commitment and actively participated within the school and the broader community.

This has been another good year and I would like to take this opportunity to share just a few of our school's achievements with you.

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) course and what a success it has been. On the Year 6 Orientation Day, the students from across Year 7 showcased their incredible were very impressed. This year, we expanded the program into Year 8 and also introduced a Year 8 Integrated Curriculum course. We are very pleased with the way students have engaged with these programs and the skills they have gained will benefit them as they move through their schooling years and into the wider world.

The high level of student skills was clearly demonstrated last week when Year 7 STEM students competed in an International STEM competition –the 'CSI Blood Pool' challenge. Students worked in teams of 4 or 5 to solve the challenge with great success. We had 4 teams in the Purchasing additional fiction and graphic novels was top 5% of the world. The challenge is delivered in the UK, NZ, Singapore and Hong Kong. One of our teams is currently ranked second in all of Australia. Very impressive results.

This was one clear example of how students are achieving academic success through the outstanding programs this school is implementing. Two other clear examples are our NAPLAN and HSC results. I would like to point out though before I talk about our NAPLAN results that it is just one small snapshot of how and what we do in the school but it is valuable to look at.

For the past four years, we have been focussing on enhancing students' literacy and numeracy skills and the NAPLAN results are just one indication that our programs are working. I would also like to point out that we are not teaching to the test but ensuring effective literacy and numeracy skills teaching are embedded in every subject.

The Centre for Educational Statistics and Evaluation analyses each school's NAPLAN results. For the past two years, the growth in student performance between when students start Year 7 at Mullum High and when they complete NAPLAN in Year 9 is above expected growth. We are acknowledged as excelling and this is across NAPLAN overall. It is also across all student ability levels. Indeed, our students who have additional learning needs are demonstrating excellent growth in literacy and numeracy skills, which is indicative of how well our support model is working and the expertise of our Special Education staff.

In comparison to schools of a similar size and complexity to us, we had more students achieve at or above the minimum standard and more students achieve results in the top 2 bands. This year, our students also performed above state average in numeracy and reading. Indeed, we have performed above state average in reading for many years. A focus of our new Librarian, Ms Kerrie Eaton and our English staff under the guidance of Head Teacher, James Clark has been further enhancing students'

enjoyment of reading. The Drop Everything and Read program and the Reading Challenge Bingo are two initiatives students have embraced this year. a focus in the Library and saw lending go from 790 books borrowed by students in Years 7-10 in 2017 to 1,834 books borrowed this year.

We were very pleased with our 2018 HSC results

and proud of our students' achievements. Students in a broad range of subjects, including English Advanced, English Extension 1, Legal Studies, Indonesian Continuers, Modern Hebrew, Visual Arts and Physics, achieved a band 6, a HSC mark above 90. Our school is very proud of the broad curriculum choices we provide for our students to meet their different abilities and interests.

40% of our students achieved above 80 per cent in at least one subject. Oliver Arthur-Andrews and Artemis Arthur-Andrews, Ava Brown, Romany Claringbull and Clare Fisher were acknowledged on the Distinguished Achievers list and Roni Ben Harush on the Top Achievers list. Roni came third in the state in Modern Hebrew Continuers.

Oliver Arthur-Andrews achieved the top ATAR rank, achieving an impressive 97.75 and was closely followed by his twin sister Artemis. Both achieved exceptional results gaining Band 6s in the majority of

their subjects. Both also accelerated in Mathematics our strong connections to our diverse, inclusive and in 2017 with Oliver achieving the equivalent of band 6 in both Extension 1 and Extension 2, the highest levels of Mathematics students can study. Oliver was one of our 2018 school captains and also excelled in this role.

Our strong connections to our diverse, inclusive and creative community are a strength of our school. The sponsorship of the scholarships mentioned above is one example of this. In addition, once again this year we have had a significant number of our students and staff actively involved in a variety of

Ethan Jimenez's Music performance was nominated for ENCORE, the showcase of the best HSC performances and Ella Rossmanith-Jones had her Industri-



al Technology Timber project nominated for Shape 2018, the exhibition of exemplary major projects. These are both outstanding achievements.

Overall, our HSC results were very solid across the cohort group and I look forward to seeing all of our 2018 HSC students achieving success in their chosen endeavours.

Once again, today we will be awarding scholarships thanks to the generous support of the McPaul family and the late Dr Suresh. In addition, this year we will be awarding additional Music and Sport scholarships thanks to the generous support of the Mullumbimby RSL Sub-branch of our music program and the PD/Health/PE Faculties fundraising.

We are very pleased that the McPaul family and representatives from the Mullumbimby RSL subbranch are with us. I would also like to say that, for all of the scholarships, we had a large number of applications and it was very difficult to make the decisions. I encourage any student who put in an application, but has missed out today, to resubmit next year.

creative community are a strength of our school. The sponsorship of the scholarships mentioned above is one example of this. In addition, once again this year we have had a significant number of our students and staff actively involved in a variety of community events. The Hospitality students catered for a number of events including the Ocean Shores Art Expo, The Mullum Show and the Golf Club Christmas party. Art staff worked with community members to ensure the Mullum Sculpture Festival was a great success. The artworks by our Year 7 art students and support students in the Castle of Dreams were exceptional. Our Year 10 Drama students performed a number of outstanding shows for primary students across the Brunswick Valley and our sports students have assisted at a variety of primary school carnivals and events. Our Year 7 Indonesian students produced incredible, creative children's books, which they shared with students at Mullumbimby Public School. Our Indigenous dancers once again thrilled audiences at NAIDOC celebrations across the shire and the performances of our Music students at the Mullum Music Festival were inspiring. If you are interested in being able to enjoy some of our students' music at home we have



our first Mullum High Music CD available for sale at just \$5 to cover the cost of producing it. Our new recording studio is proving to be a big hit.

Another example of a strong community connection

is the way our school and P&C work together. Our P&C are a fantastic group of people who are generous with their time, assistance with writing grant applications, responding to issues impacting on the



school, support of the school in decision making, fundraising for additional resources, promotion of the school and willingness to get involved.

Due to staff and P&C working together to write grant applications, our school is one of the schools selected to gain some additional government funded air-conditioning early next year. The movie fundraiser at the Brunswick Heads Picture House organised by the P&C was a fantastic community event and I look forward to attending the first one next year. Staff and students working together at the Mullum Music Festival, was not only great for raising funds for the school, but also for growing friendships. During the holidays a new electronic sign will be erected at the front of the school to the replace our old manual sign. Funded by our P&C.

Over the holidays we will also be having a demountable installed. It will be used for a new tutorial program being implemented in 2019. The Tutorial Program will cater for the small number of students who have difficulty managing their behaviour in a mainstream classroom. A ten-week program will focus on supporting these students to learn new skills in an intensive, highly structured environment and return to their mainstream classes with additional support to ensure they become successful learners. The school will gain additional staffing including a specialist behaviour support teacher.

This program will be an additional program to add to the already outstanding wellbeing programs we offer across the school. Our school's focus on ensur- This year, three well-respected members of our

ing a supportive learning environment promotes student wellbeing. In May, 251 of our Year 7 to 10 students completed a statewide survey and the majority of our students indicated that they felt valued and cared for at Mullum High. They value schooling, they have positive relationships with other students and staff at our school and they believe that the majority of Mullum High students demonstrate positive behaviour at school.

In this same survey students indicated that they have the opportunity and enjoy participating in extra-curricular activities and sports. Our school does conduct many wonderful excursions including the Year 7 camp on the Gold Coast, the Special Education camp at Evans Head, the Year 10 Snow trip and the Italian Exchange program to mention just a few. In the sport report you will hear of the many outstanding achievements of our students in a wide variety of sports this year.

I have mentioned only a few of our successes this year and you will hear of more as students receive



awards. The wonderful things happening in our school would not happen without the dedicated, hard-working and highly qualified staff we have here. I would like to thank each and every staff member for their outstanding contributions to our students and school community.

staff are retiring – Science teacher Mr John Kilpatrick, Casual teacher Mr Howard Thomas and School Counsellor Ms Camilla Nova. Each of these teachers has made an enormous difference for our students and school. I wish them all a wonderful retirement. Sadly this year, a valued member of staff, Ms Suzie Reilly, passed away and our thoughts will especially be with her family during this holiday season.

This year, we also moved across to a new statewide payroll system, new website platform and new financial budgeting tool. I would like to take this opportunity to thank our School Administration Manager, Paul Evans and his staff for the additional training and work they had to undertake to support the implementation of these. We are looking forward to them making administration easier once they have been fully embedded. Moving across to the new website platform during this year means that at this moment in time our website is not as current as we would like it. Having worked on developing an understanding of the new platform, staff will focus on updating it early in 2019.

A very big thank you to the sponsors of today's award ceremony and to the wonderful special guests who have once again taken time out of their busy lives to support our students. Please take the time to read the list of sponsors on your program. They make an incredible difference for Mullumbimby High School.

Thank you to Ms Hogan, Ms Spilstead, Mr Colli, Mr McKenzie and their staff for the organisation of today's ceremony and finally congratulations to all our students on your achievements this year. You are a fantastic group of young people and I am very proud of you.

#### **Re: ELEVATE EDUCATION STUDY SEMINARS**

**The School Student Transport Scheme** (SSTS) provides eligible school students with free or subsidised travel from home to school.

The scheme includes:

- Free travel to and from home and school on approved train, bus, ferry and light rail services during school term. Discounted travel on buses between home and school with a <u>School Term Bus Pass</u>.
- Free travel on NSW TrainLink Regional services and long distance coach services for boarding school students.

<u>Subsidised travel</u> to and from school in private vehicles in areas where there is no public transport available.

Students with a disability who are unable to travel to and from school under the School Student Transport Scheme may be eligible for assistance under the Department of Education <u>Assisted School Travel Program opens in new window</u>.

#### **Technology Mandatory (TEC)**

Year 7 and 8 students have been busy over the last few weeks finishing up all of their projects. Aprons, Timber Boxes, Engineering Mechanisms, and Gourmet Fudge should all be making their way home.

#### Hospitality

Year 11 / 12 Hospitality students have become catering superstars. During Term 4, students have completed work placement hours at a number of events around the shire. The big event was catering at the 'Mullumbimby Agriculture Show'. Students planned, prepared, served and smiled to the crowds and the show judges. Throughout the day students looked after the crowd with morning tea, lunch and afternoon tea.

Students also provided a sit down lunch for 35 people last week. This lunch was more formal and students involved set the dining room with a Christmas theme, created an alternate lunch which included pan fried salmon, and spinach and ricotta filled chicken breast. As well as participating in these activities students have been mastering their coffee skills. At school we have spent lessons learning about coffee - students have learnt to extract coffee, texturise milk and pour lattes, flat whites and cappuccino's.

The students also recently entered the CWA bake off in Mullumbimby. The task was to bake and enter a cinnamon tea cake. Coen Sentance took out first prize with his winning entry and Chelsea Williams received a commendation.

#### **Year 9 Food Tech**

Students have participated in the 'Food Product Development' unit of work this term and have created some real masterpieces. The first challenge was designing a 'trendy milkshake'. The second challenge was to design and enter a range of cupcakes in the 'Show'. The major assessment task was to design a dessert based on a literature source. The dessert had to include a basic cake recipe, a basic mousse recipe and a basic biscuit recipe. Results included a version of the Cookie Monster, a Where's Wally? #### **STEM**

Year 7 STEM students have had a huge Term 4. Throughout the term, they have been finishing off and finalising their 'Sustainable Tiny Homes'. Students have applied their skills and knowledge and created a model to scale.

During week 8 of the term, we visited 'HumpyCo' at Bangalow so students could see real life 'tiny homes' and compare their models.

HumpyCo gave the students a tour of their factory and provided information about sustainability, material used and structure techniques.

The 'CSI Blood Pool' challenge was delivered to students. During the session, students were exposed to a crime scene, which they had to solve. Clues and challenges occurred throughout the day, with DNA testing, forensic screening and blood sampling to find the guilty person.

Students worked in teams of 4 or 5 to solve the challenge with great success. We had 4 teams in the top 5% of the world (the challenge is delivered in the UK, NZ, Singapore and Hong Kong) with 1 of our groups currently ranked second in all of Australia.

Students should be very pleased with their efforts in STEM this year and their overall achievements.









#### **MULLUM KIDS GET A TASTE OF 'TINY LIVING'**

Last week on Tuesday November 27<sup>th</sup>, over 100 Year 7 students from Mullumbimby High School took over the "Humpy Display Village" in the Bangalow Industrial Estate, to hear the owners explain the ideas behind Humpy Co.

The students were visiting the village to learn about 'tiny living' - a unit they are currently studying at school. The students toured the 'village' and checked out the Humpy product range on display. They got to see inside the factory and saw in person the raw materials being used to create these creative, flat-packed, backyard pods and how the 'Humpy dream' came to be.

Students got to learn how the pods are made from order to delivery, the wide range of uses they have, and how quick and easy a Humpy is to install – a Humpy can be installed in under a day. The team also touched on the impact and advantages of businesses being environmentally conscious.

"The beauty of a Humpy is that it comes flat-packed, so can be installed without the need to remove fence panels or hire cranes. They are environmentally friendly, do not require footings and when you need to move it, simply dismantle it and take it with you", said Travis Lowe, Director.

A family-run business, the Humpy Co. team is led by Travis Lowe, a qualified carpenter of 15 years along with his father Brian Lowe, a registered builder for over 40 years, who has run his own award-winning architecture business for the last 35 years. They produce backyard pods that serve a variety of purposes.



- Sometimes things didn't go to plan and emergencies and change arose, but they always acted respectfully and assisted where they could.

I am looking forward to our continual relationship with Mullumbimby High School. This week is one which I sincerely enjoy every year.

I love sharing how much I love nursing and how proud I am of my place of work. When they left, they went and said bye with hugs to a couple of our patients and our staff – truly precious moment

# THE MAGICAL CARPET PLAYS

ne of the biggest tests for all actors is when they have limited props, a small selection of costumes, a few carpets as a backdrop and a young audience to enthrall. This is also a time when the actors can experience a profound and magical connection with their audience.

At Mulliumbimby High School this style of performance is part of the curriculum for their Year 10 students who study the simplistic, bare type of theatre which is inspired Peter Brook, the powerfully innovative 20th century director.

The students bring a collection of children's stories to life using a trunk of musical instruments, a few boxes of costumes and a large carpet. Their audience is approximately 100 primary school children who sit on the floor around the performers.

Known as 'The Carpet Plays' this theatre production travels to the larger state primary schools and invites other smaller schools to Mullumbimby High so they can watch too.

This magical performance has been part of Mullumbimby High School tradition for almost twenty years so many of the students that are now performing will remember watching 'The Carpet Plays' when they were young children at primary school.

We spoke with their teacher, Marisa Mcewan, to learn more about this unique theatre production.

#### HOW ARE 'THE CARPET PLAYS' UNIQUE?

The actors know they are relying on the quality of expression in their voices and bodies to captivate a young audience, skillfully and playfully transforming into characters and objects to tell their story. Through research, observation and discussions they are learning about young children and what they like and enjoy most about stories. They are sharing personal experiences and childhood memories, recalling their favourite children's books and why these were so special, including language, characters, settings, images, motifs.

#### WHAT IS THE INTENTION OF 'THE CARPET PLAYS'?

We are hoping for close and direct contact between the actors and the children. Our intention is to make joy and laughter, to delight and give delight.

#### Why is this initiative so important to your student's development and what do they gain from the experience?

Performance is about openness, honesty, giving and the utmost discipline of focus. Our actors are learning first hand of their profound responsibility and relationship with the audience. They are studying the art of engagement, with practices intended to help them create adaptations that will appeal to children's imagination, humour and sense of wonder. Through engagement, the performances are designed to promote emotional, mental and imaginative growth for our performers and their young audiences.

Can the invisible be made visible through the actor's presence? Through a physical approach to acting and a vocabulary not necessarily tied to language, our young performers are celebrating their love of literature, fairytale and theatre, hopefully inspiring generations of performers and lovers of theatre and story.

#### South East Queensland University Tour Thursday 6<sup>th</sup> and Friday 7<sup>th</sup> of December, 2018

Each year Mullumbimby High and Byron Bay High Schools join forces to take our new Year 12 students to visit five tertiary institutions located in SE Queensland. Students visited Bond University, Griffith University, Queensland University of Technology, University of Queensland and Southern Cross University, Gold Coast Campus. Students were able to experience and familiarise themselves at each of the Universities and even spent a night in Uni accommodation (single room dorms) at Union College, UQ. All Universities have an opportunity to showcase their courses, faculties and campuses and allow students time for Q/A during each presentation.

This year we focused on the top 15 questions asked by High School students and covered the following topics: Accommodation options and Types, Internships, Work, Life, Uni Balance; Enrolment, Course or Program advice, Can I change courses or programs, Can I defer; Scholarships; Double Degrees, International Exchange Programs, Study Types eg FT, PT, Flexible, Online; The Student Experience, Student Help, Support and Services, Extra Curricular eg Sports, Clubs etc and finally, How do I choose the right University for me? Early Entry, Fees including "costs" of changing units or courses and or "failing" a unit.

What a fabulous opportunity this is for our students and a great start in adopting some direction and focus toward their Year 12 studies and future pathways. As always, I was exceptionally proud of our students and their levels of maturity displayed in representing themselves and our school. 


#### **ERIN ADIE**

rowing up in a musical household was just the beginning for Ethan Jimenez who has recently graduated from Mullumbimby High School. At five he learnt to play the violin, at ten he started learning guitar and now, at the cusp of adulthood he has been pre-selected to perform at the Sydney Opera House.

His rendition of 'Lenny' by Stevie Ray Vaughan in his practical examination for his HSC exams was so powerful that the judges nominated him for ENCORE, a showcase of best HSC presentations.

"It's a 5 minute song that is pretty much just one big guitar solo and really features technical aspects of guitar playing through a wide range of techniques," said Ethan.

"The roots of my guitar playing come from blues, and I really started obsessing over playing the guitar when I started playing funk and funk/rock. Now I have been trying to expand my playing in areas such as jazz, classical and so on."

Ethan was brought up in the Northern Beaches of Sydney and moved to the Byronshire in 2016. He is immensely grateful for the opportunity to experience his last few years of schooling at Mullumbimby High, especially due to the guidance and encouragement from the music department.

"The amazing musicians and teachers that I have been surrounded by have been a catalyst for this, and as a result, my passion for music is always increasing, especially with all the performing and recording opportunities I have been given at school," said Ethan. "Bede has been a great teacher. He is extremely dedicated to us succeeding in the subject and making sure we have everything to do so. He provides constructive criticism so we are constantly striving to do better, and offers solutions to the things that need improving on."

Like most young men in his age, Ethan is looking at his future with a mixture of excitement and uncertainty. The rest of his life is full of opportunity but is also an unknown entity that is now under his control.

"Funnily enough the scary part for me is not so much the prospect of me planning out the rest of my life, but the question I have been asked at least once a day since I sat my last exam which is "what are you doing after school?", everyone expects us to already know what we are going to do for the rest of our lives and it's like, hah! As if anyone does!"

The most important things to Ethan right now are travelling and music. He believes in the magic and connection of music and has already performed at the Mullum Music Festival with several fellow musicians and classmates.

"I love the vast diversity and possibilities of music, and how communal it is; being able to connect through music with someone who might not even speak the same language as you is one of the amazing things about it, and overall it's just really fun!"

Humble to the core, Ethan doesn't like to measure himself by the word 'success', however to fellow musicians looking to find their way, he recommends you surround yourself with a diverse mix of other musicians and learn as much as you can, whenever you can.

2018 has been a great year for borrowing and reading for many of our students. This year our Library and English faculty have undertaken a number of initiatives to promote reading for pleasure.


#### Initiatives include:


