

### **Principal's Report**

Our final Lyrebird for 2021 celebrates and acknowledges our talented students and teachers, our hardworking staff and our supportive school community.

Mullumbimby High School continues to be a dynamic school community where high expectations, hard work, commitment, passion and resilience enable students and staff to work together and achieve their best.

2021 has been a year where the whole school community needed to put their perseverance and resilience to the ultimate test. However, we have made it though and our students, the continuity of their engagement in learning, and the wellbeing of both students and staff, have been and our focus.

I congratulate our students on their successes with their learning, engagement, sporting pursuits and extracurricular achievements throughout 2021. We admire their resilience and courage to continue to move forward in order to reach their goals. Enjoy reading about some of these achievements in this final Lyrebird edition for 2021.

I congratulate our Year 12 students who have just completed their HSC and I would like to announce that many of them have received and accepted offers into the tertiary courses of their choice. Their results will be available early January 2022 due to delays with COVID lockdowns earlier in the year.

We completed our external validation in October and we were pushing towards excelling in School Learning Culture and Student Wellbeing. We now have a new school plan; however, three Strategic Directions remain the same and will drive our 2022-2025 School Improvement Plan:

- 1. Student Growth and Attainment
- 2. Student Engagement and Wellbeing
- 3. Quality Teacher Practice and Collaboration

In 2022, we have several initiatives planned to enhance student engagement in their learning. In Year 7, we will introduce a Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) initiative where all Year 7 students will purchase and bring their laptop to school to learn. The information about this has been sent to all Year 6 families with links to best value devices. There will be school assistance for families to support this, if required. This initiative will support the learning of students and provide a more sustainable model for the school's big picture of our Technology 5-Year Plan. Link to our website regarding <u>BYOD programme</u> and <u>free software</u>.

A second initiative are the introduction of Yondr pouches to reduce the distraction and misuse of mobile phones in the school. Each student in Year 7-12 will receive a Yondr pouch to place their mobile phones in during school hours to be locked and out of site/out of mind. We plan to work with Year 12 during Term 1 to increase their mobile phone use freedom at school, but for the initiative to be effective, it will commence with all students. Research and information for most North Coast schools who have already introduced the Yondr pouch, the learning environment for every students in every learning space is significantly enhanced and the interaction between students in the playground much improved (see in this newsletter).

In 2021, we established 10 staff teams to drive initiatives for improvement in the school. They are listed below with a short summary of achievements and their leaders in brackets. This initiative will continue in 2022.

• Literacy and Numeracy (James Clark, Deputy Principal - Janelle Molyneux, Head Teacher Mathematics -Sib Duff, Head Teacher English)

The Literacy and Numeracy team strive to support students to improve their learning outcomes in reading, writing and numeracy. There have been excellent results in Year 7 and 9 NAPLAN with growth from Year 7 to 9 falling into the 'excellence' domain. The Intensive Learning Support Program (ILSP) in the school has been successful provide students at risk with additional Literacy and Numeracy tuition, and this will continue in 2022.

#### • High Potential Gifted Education (HPGE) (Toni Elliott, Head Teacher Senior Studies)

The HPGE team identify MHS gifted and talented students to maximise their learning outcomes. This has involved identifying High Potential and Gifted students whose potential exceeds or significantly exceeds that of students of the same age in one or more domains: intellectual, creative, social-emotional, and physical. In 2021 the have been several initiatives including a Stage 5 gifted History class, the Learning Journey process and two Stage 6 students, Amanda Bower and Beau Berghausen being part of the state-wide HPGE initiative. #### • Whole School Positive Behaviour (Helen Bub-Connor, Head Teacher Wellbeing)

The Whole School Positive Behaviour team have worked as a team and with whole school staff to ensure we sustain and grow positively with stated behavioural expectations across all school settings, that all students are positively acknowledged through our rewards system and that we consistently managed and apply consequences for problem behaviours at a whole school, classroom and targeted level.

#### Family and Community Partnerships (Sophie Mount Head Teacher HSIE)

The Family and Community Partnerships team has worked to engage our school and local community in several ways and continued to build strong connections that support our students, school and the local community.

#### Aboriginal Education (Cameron Johnson, Deputy Principal)

The Aboriginal Education team works to ensure our ATSI students are recognised, valued and included in every aspect of the school in additional to leading Aboriginal Perspectives across the school. Our Term 4 NAIDOC day was a huge success.

#### Technology (David Steedman Technology Teacher)

The technology Team have ensured that technology is integrated into the daily life as educators at MHS. This team is about how we use the team to plan and manage the 'big picture' of technology in the school, have someone from each faculty represented to assist in ensuring each faculty gets what they need/want in terms of technology, identify problem areas where devices or training/ support is needed. It has provided the opportunity to upskill interested staff in the areas of technology/tech support to reduce the burden on the Technology Coordinator. To name a few of the initiative, in 2021 MHS had joined the state-wide Rural Gap initiative gaining significant technology resources for students and staff, introduced the student Technology Team who work on Wednesday afternoons to support staff and the school with technology maintenance projects, have employed a Technology Support Officer to further support technology initiatives and we have employed a second technology teacher, Ms Jane Lee too commence in 2022.

#### Sustainability (Ben Harris Science/Agriculture teacher)

The sustainability team have engaged staff and students at Mullumbimby High School as well as the

greater Mullumbimby community to develop sustainable practices. The introduction of a student "Green Team' have been responsible for maintaining and extending current waste services, development of new innovative projects and assisting the student body in pursuing a sustainable future.

#### • Staff Wellbeing (Cristhian Colli Head Teacher Science)

The Staff Wellbeing Team have ensured that Staff Wellbeing is always on the agenda and working towards improved Staff Wellbeing at MHS. The team have worked in collaboration with The Department's Health and Safety Special Support team as part of the MHS whole school teacher wellbeing initiative.

#### WH&S Team (Rose Lobban HSIE Teacher and Greg Armstrong Principal)

The WH&S team will work to ensure school is a safe place for teaching and learning for all stakeholders and coordinate H&S events such as the lockdown and evacuation drills. In 2021 every learning space has gone through an internal audit and WH&S issues are being addressed.

I wish to thank all parents and carers for their on-going support of our school throughout the year, and also thank our P&C led by Damian Farrell who continue to be very supportive and provided a valuable contribution to our school community.

I wish everyone a safe and happy Christmas period and holiday break and look forward to returning in 2022.

# Mobile Phones and Yondr Program

Dear Parents, Caregivers and Students,

We are writing to share exciting news - we will be making our school a phone-free space staring in 2022 to improve teaching, learning and wellbeing. We will be using a system called Yondr to achieve this goal.

Yondr has been used across the world in over 1,000 schools, as well as at concerts, comedy shows, businesses, camps, weddings and special events of all kinds. The goal of these phone-free spaces is to encourage people to engage with each other and their surroundings.

Current research and evidence indicates that learning and social behaviour improve drastically when students are fully engaged with their teachers and classmates in the classroom and during break times. Our current school policy of having mobile phones "off and away in your bag" has been in place for several years now and with the Yondr Pouch program, we aim to improve our procedures even further. To support students with following teacher instructions and school policy, the Yondr Program employs a simple, lockable pouch that stores their mobile phone.

Every student will secure their phone in a personally assigned Yondr pouch when they arrive at school each day. Students will maintain possession of their phones and will not use them until their pouches are opened at the end of the school day. This will allow students to utilise their mobile phones when travelling to and from school to support their safety.

Students will be issued with their Yondr pouch during the first week of Term 1, 2022. Students will be required to bring their Yondr pouch to and from school each day and are responsible for their pouch at all times. This will provide students with the support they need to refrain from engaging with their mobile phone during the day, in line with school policy. As per our current policy, parents and caregivers are to contact the front office on (02) 6684 2600 if they need to communicate information regarding their child/ ward.

We are encouraged by the effects of this system in other learning institutions. Yondr surveyed over 900 school partners to measure the effects of creating phone-free educational environments. These schools achieved notable progress in multiple areas:

- 65% of schools saw an improvement in academic performance
- 74% of schools saw an improvement in student behaviour
- 83% of schools saw an improvement in student engagement in the classroom

pouch in a matter of seconds for students once they are in a safe and secure location.

#### Will my student's phone be safe?

Students are in possession of their phone - in their Yondr pouch - for the entire school day. We will advise students to store the pouch in their backpacks, whilst maintaining sight of their backpack during this time. If bags are left in a room by the class, the door will be locked to ensure safety.

#### What if the Yondr pouch gets damaged?

The Yondr pouch is property of Mullumbimby High School, as the school has provided the pouch free of charge. If a student damages or tampers with a Yondr pouch, they will be held responsible.

- In All Cases: The student's phone will be confiscated by the school. Failure to abide by this instruction may result in a suspension.
- **First Occasion:** the student will be allowed to take the phone home at the end of the day and a pouch replacement fee of \$15 will be invoiced. The student will not be able to have their phone at school until their replacement pouch has been paid for and issued.
- Second Occasion: On the second occasion, the student will not be allowed to collect their phone until a meeting with the deputy principal occurs with the student and a parent/caregiver. Note: Damage consists of any signs that the physical integrity of the pouch has been compromised, whether intentional or unintentional, as determined by the school or Yondr staff. What if my child does not place their phone in the pouch?
- In All Cases: The phone will be confiscated by a member of the executive team and placed in a safe location till the end of the day. Failure to abide by this instruction may result in a suspension.
- **First Occasion:** The student will be issued with a formal caution and be allowed to take their phone home at the end of the school day.
- Second Occasion: The student's parents/caregiver will need to attend the school to collect the phone and their child. The student will not be allowed to return to school until a meeting with the deputy principal has taken place. This may result in a suspension for continued disobedience.

How can I clean my student's Yondr pouch? Yondr pouches can be washed in cold water for a short cycle and air dried. Pouches can also be cleaned with a disinfectant cleaner. Pouches are not dry cleanable or dryer safe.

### TAS—Technical and Applied Studies

Wow! What a year in our TAS classrooms! Our digital, industrial technology, design and technology, kitchens and the textiles rooms have seen an amazing amount of work being completed on student projects. It is a credit to the students and the teachers to see the completed projects come to fruition.

Miss Lynch has had the textile rooms open during lunchtimes with students completing tote bags, dresses, wall hangings and our senior students starting work on their major projects for the HSC.

Our industrial technology rooms have seen the Year 10 students completing their major projects which has included surfboard racks, cabinets, drawers, skateboards, outdoor chairs, vintage arcade game consoles and vertical gardens.

Year 9 have been completing a cardboard furniture challenge whilst Year 7 and Year 8 have been completing wooden Japanese boxes and birdhouses. Our digital classrooms are always busy with Mr Steedman with students completing work during class and lunchtimes on 3D CAD designs, virtual reality and coding challenges.

Our Hospitality students have been busy catering for the Year 12 formal with Ms Samios and completing units of work to gain their Certificate II in Food and Beverage competencies.

Year 10 have been completing end of year cooking challenges including the ROSA practical exam and their Food Truck assessment.

Year 7 and Year 8 have been working through Food Safety and Nutrition including chocolate chip cookies and homemade ice cream.

We are all looking forward to another competitive year next year and hope to bring a few more titles home to Mullumbimby.



#### **PDHPE**

This term our Physical Activity and Sport Students drew inspiration from the Paralympics and participated in a variety of modified games. One popular game was Goalball. Goalball is a team sport played indoors by athletes with vision impairment. The object of the game is to roll the ball into the opponent's goal while the opposing players try to block the ball with their bodies. Bells inside the ball help orientate the players by indicating the direction of the oncoming ball. Our students were blindfolded and had to listen to the bells and then work with their teammates to stop the opposition from scoring.

In Year 7, PDHPE lessons students have been participating in bat and strike games such as three ball Tee ball. While at Sport Year 7 have experienced a variety of sports including Fishing at Brunswick Heads and Tennis with coach Steve Gort.

We are continuing with our accelerated Mathematics classes and this year 16 students completed the Advanced Mathematics HSC course while in Year 11 (see below just before entering the hall for their HSC examination).

Our new year 12 cohort have embraced the extension courses offered at Mullumbimby High School with close to 20% of the cohort enrolled in both Extension 1 and 2 English, 7 students in Extension 2 Mathematics and 4 in Extension History.

The HPGE team at Mullumbimby High School looks forward to further developing the Learning Journey process for all students from years 7-10 in 2022.

Our 2021 Elective Subjects have provided initiatives and opportunities for the identified High Potential and Gifted students within their courses. The Year 10 Film, Video and Digital Media students have participated in creating films for the promotion and documentation of whole school events to experience real life Industry practices. While Year 11 Art students for 2022 were involved in a 3 day intensive Art Enrichment Program to embrace practice and further develop their media and process skills. The Winter Showcase in Term 2, replicated a Creative Industry event to provide Music, Drama and Art students with an environment to perform and demonstrate their unique talent in the community domain, both celebrating and supporting their creative potential.

The Sports Excellence programs continued to grow in 2021. The Futsal program and the Year 7 Sports Excellence program have been developed in response to the needs of students who have a passion for sport and wish to achieve excellence in their sporting endeavours. The aim of the programs is to project students' learning experiences beyond what is possible in normal timetabled PDHPE and Sport lessons. Brain Hedge facilitates the Futsal program and coaches the students during school hours and after school. The students have participated in a variety of competitions in Northern NSW and on the Gold Coast. This year the Year 7 Sports Excellence program expanded to include Athletics training. Motivated and talented athletes who were keen to improve their skills and performances were offered after school training in preparation for the Zone and Regional Athletics carnivals.

Having said that, English teachers are renowned for attempting word quizzes just for fun, so we'll give it a shot.

This term has been both challenging and inspiring, and we have thoroughly enjoyed watching the way students' have embraced all that they've learned to create some truly remarkable works. For example, some of our Year 7 have been studying the Hero's Journey and applying it to Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone, alongside a study of film techniques, and have put together great presentations incorporating screenshots from the film.

In Year 8, students have studied a range of texts and concepts, including the concept of 'belonging', and have composed wonderfully insightful speeches (with palm cards and all!) about the power of connection.

Ms Murphy's Year 9 class have completed a study of Homelessness and presented informative discursive presentations. Many students were particularly taken with the idea of hostile architecture and the way this further exacerbates the experience of homelessness. This class has also taken up a small donation for the Mullumbimby Community Centre to put towards helping people experiencing homelessness.





# Anti Homeless Architecture

Anti homeless architecture are certain things stopping homeless people from camping/sleeping in a certain area. They are placed there by the council and government to apparently maintain order in the streets. They also want the streets to be clean because they think no one wants to see homeless people on the streets.



As for our Year 10 students, once they completed their ROSA exams and finalised modules of work, we placed them in their Year 11 English class selections (Advanced English, Standard English, or English Studies) and explored with them the sorts of skills, knowledge, understandings, and perspectives they'll need to help them navigate their English work next year. Students have reported really enjoying these classes and the opportunity to extend themselves and to explore issues ranging from philosophy to literary genres to the way words shape our everyday lives.

With our new Year 12 students, we've commenced the first HSC modules of study, examining the beautifully evocative poetry of Ali Cobby-Eckermann (in Standard English) and the McCarthy-era-inspired play The Crucible by Arthur Miller (in Advanced English). The conversations engendered by these texts have served as a reminder of the power of language to inform perceptions, and of the ability of our students to empathise with experiences beyond their own. In Advanced English, students composed essays and delivered sophisticated presentations regarding the core themes explored in The Crucible and in another text of their choice. Their work (two examples of which are below) demonstrates maturity and sophisticated understanding, skills that will stand them in good stead next year.



In other news, we - as a faculty - have been working hard behind the scenes to prepare for 2022. We've rearranged our staffroom in such a way that the space now promotes better connection, collaboration, and communication. We've welcomed new staff, supported several new student and beginning teachers, and created amazing resources and programs of study. We've worked together to develop concurrent modules of study for all junior classes in 2022, as well as refining our assessment timelines and protocols, and we're also encouraging all English staff to participate in HSC marking next year to enhance their pedagogical knowledge and assessment skills. This year, two of our staff have been selected to mark HSC Extension 1 English, providing our school with invaluable opportunities for improved teaching and learning.

In all, this term has been, in

many regards, one shaped by contexts and circumstances beyond our control. From an extended Year 12 and delayed HSC exams for our recently graduated students, to last minute pivots back into online learning during our penultimate week of the year, this term has served as a reminder of the importance of education, the interconnectedness of our school community, and the formidable resilience and good humour of the students we teach. As always, it is an honour to work with these magnificent young people and to play our role, however small or large, in their learning and lives.



Finally, in an unexpected gain for Kingscliff High and an unexpected loss for us, we bid farewell to one of our favourite and longest-serving English teachers, Sarah Connah! Sarah is an inimitable teacher, friend, and colleague who will be sorely missed by staff and students alike. We wish her all the very best!

And so, as we bid adieu to 2021, we extend to you all our deepest wishes for a restful and restorative summer break, and we look forward to seeing our students - older and wiser - in 2022.

Our students continue to show they are resilient, and willing to work with their teachers and support staff through their respectful communication, and explaining their wellbeing needs.


As a Wellbeing team, we have responded by providing numerous strategies, activities and programs to ensure we are meeting our students' needs.


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DRAMA

MUSIC

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# **INDONESIAN**

It has been a whirlwind of a term in the Indonesian classroom. Our students have been working hard to complete their final assessments, and have been exploring the Indonesian culture through contemporary mediums such as music, film, dance and artworks. In Year 7, our primary focus has been on school. Students practised their Indonesian language skills by ordering in Indonesian and conversing with the warung staff. Next year will be an exciting year in the Indonesian classroom, thanks to our BRIDGE partnership. Hopefully, we will experience many more freedoms and be able to hold cultural dance, batik and cooking workshops. We will also continue to build our relationship with our sister school, SMAN 5 Mataram, through sharing emails and videos, Zoom lessons, and more.*
