#### **Principal's Report**

Welcome to our Term 2 Lyrebird edition. This Newsletter is a celebration of the great work our students, staff and community have been involved in over the past 10 weeks. I always find it extraordinary to see the wonderful achievements that take place in our school each term and I hope you enjoy reading the articles and seeing the opportunities and successes of our students.

Year 12 students are half way through their school year, with exams starting in October, and the resilience, maturity and dedication displayed by our students has been nothing short of incredible. Many of our Year 12 students lost their homes during the floods but continued to pursue their studies diligently throughout the crisis. I'd like to take this opportunity to congratulate and thank them for their unbreakable spirit throughout this challenging time. Our immediate priority is offering support and advice for performance exams, practical projects and submitted works/projects. The CEO of NESA, Paul Martin, has already made one visit to MHS to talk with staff and students and he was impressed by our students and their reflection upon their HSC studies and disruptions they have experienced. Paul will visit in Term 3 to hear again, first hand, how our students are going and what further support can be provided for them in their preparation for their HSC.

We are due to commence our school restoration process from the flood. MHS is part of the \$67 million Education Flood Recovery Package which is in place to help students and teachers as people continue to rebuild. Please see the additional notes about this process. The recent financial support available for school communities impacted by the major flooding events in the Northern Rivers with access to up to \$500 for students has been very welcome. Families can use the student support for school-related expenses such as uniforms, books, pens, lunch boxes or excursions, recognising that many students in our community have experienced severe disruption.

Mullumbimby High School has excellent counselling and support services in place such as a school counsellor as well as an excellent school psychologist who was able to work with both students and staff around the trauma experienced. Our school wellbeing team have been highly supportive of our students. Every family at the school was called personally by school staff to check in and see how they could be best supported during the crisis. I wish to thank the work of Ms Emily Langtry as relieving Head Wellbeing this semester. Emily will step down in Term 3 and Ms Peta Huish will take over the Wellbeing Team next term.

We also have updated our <u>Wellbeing Policy</u> for 2022 and it is available on our website. Thank you to Emily Langtry who has been acting as a Wellbeing Head Teacher this term.

As our community continues to deal with the trauma from these devastating floods, this extra help for students means they will be supported to continue working towards reaching their goals. For now, I encourage all our students in Years 7 to 10 to keep learning and working towards their personal and educational goals.

I wish to thank the P&C and many other generous groups who have donated money and time to our school. The support has been extraordinary. I wish to thank Allison Rogers, Frankie Sharman, Emily Langtry and their team for hatching and make happen the JustGiving fundraising project which raised over \$40,000 for our students, and our huge thanks to the P&C once again who have coordinated and organised the funds for use.

I look forward to returning to an excellent Semester Two. The staff will commence with a whole school planning day on the first day, to work together to ensure our school is ready to support all our students with excellent teaching, learning, wellbeing and extra-curricular support for the remainder of this year, 2023 and beyond. Students will start on Tuesday 19 July.

#### Flood restoration Program for MHS – Update 22 June 2022

In the last week the construction contract has been signed with Bennett/Lipson Construction for work to begin on flood remediation work at our school.

On Monday 20 June, I met with Project Control Group. It included representatives from the School Infrastructure NSW, Public Works and the construction company Bennett Constructions: <a href="https://www.bennett.net.au/">https://www.bennett.net.au/</a>

In short, there is a lot of work to do, but it is great that we now have a team on board and we can keep moving ahead, so we can get back into our refurbished spaces as soon as possible. The main works here are at Mullumbimby High School are:

- Getting our beautiful library back as the heart of our school;
- Repairing the hall;

- Fixing our performing arts space for our drama and music students;
- Remediating and refurbishing our staff areas in the original school building;
- Remediating other office and interview room areas;
- Lifting The Hut;
- Repairing the sports oval;

A large part of the work will be around mould remediation as a result of the floodwater to make sure all our buildings are safe for students and staff.

Most importantly, **there are also opportunities to modernise or redesign some** of the affected areas so they work better for us and do justice to the fantastic work our teachers are doing here at MHS – which is great news for our junior students who reap the benefits from the work.

In terms of timeframe, I have been advised that all work should be complete by the end of Term 1, 2023 – pending weather, supply chain issues and contractor availability.

The Department and Public Works Advisory are planning a community information session for early next term to update all our parents on the work, and the timeframes, as well as any questions you may have about the project. We may look at co-ordinating that with our parent teacher night when everyone is here at the school or we may hold it as a separate session at a time that we know will work for the most number of parents. I will share that invitation in due time.

Thank you to Year 7 and Year 8 parents who came to our meet the parents afternoon tea. It was a great opportunity to catch up.


This shows how lucky we are to have an alternative school like Mullum that can be very supportive of causes like this. We cannot wait for the next event!



### **ABORIGINAL EDUCATION AT MULLUMBIMBY HIGH SCHOOL**

26<sup>th</sup> May, Thursday was National Sorry Day in Remembrance of the Stolen Generation.

27<sup>th</sup> May is the start of Reconciliation Week. This year's theme is "Be Brave and Make Change" where we ask all Aussies to come and walk with us. To learn and ask questions about our shared history, our culture, traditions, knowledge and our many achievements now and in the past.



Tuesday 31<sup>st</sup> May, it was my privilege to take our Year 7 and Year 8 Indigenous students from Mullumbimby High School, Brunswick Heads, Ocean Shores, and Mullumbimby Primary to see a beautiful and moving film about a loving couple brought together through the trauma of the Stolen Generations, and how their love for each other help heal the wounds from being taken from their families. The film was called "Wash My Soul in the River's Flow". A love story about two of the greatest Indigenous singers Australia has ever seen: Ruby Hunter and Archie Roach. It was quite a heavy and confronting film, but the students show it respect and came away with a positive message. We then took the students to the Murwillumbah Museum where they learnt about the local Dreaming Stories. All the students were a credit to the families and schools showing great respect throughout the day.

I would like to remind everyone. It is also the 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Mabo Decision.

Finally, a big cheer out to Summer Browning for making it to the State AFL Travelling and playing at Albury this week.

#### **ENGLISH**

Term 1 of this year was about as memorable as it gets, for all the wrong reasons. And so as we began Term 2, we were all conscious of how exhausted and frazzled most students were feeling and how hard we would need to work to not only catch up on course content but, more importantly, to restore relationships between and with students and to have classes reconnect. It is so wonderful to be able to report that, ten weeks later, our school feels so much more cohesive, settled, and back in the groove of learning!

This term, in Year 7 we've been enjoying a novel study. Students have explored a novel in depth and examined the various conventions of different genres. It's been wonderful to have this chance to get to better know our youngest and newest students!

In Year 8, we've explored Shakespeare's villains and why it is that our stories embody the lesser aspects of human potential. Students loved this study and the glimpse into Shakespearean narratives that it afforded. They also refined their essay-writing skills and their ability to express points of view using textual evidence. In Year 9, students have studied Romeo and Juliet and examined both the romance of young love and the perils of entrenched and dogmatic beliefs that end up positioning one group of people against another.

Year 10 have spent the term looking at various documentaries and the way they're shaped. Modules such as this are designed to teach students the sort of critical thinking they need to be able to navigate the world, and students loved the chance to also select their own documentaries for their assessment task in this module.



Our Year 11 students have finally been able to experience the joys of an uninterrupted term of senior study and have managed to reach the end of this ten week period with a greater appreciation for the skills they need to develop over the coming months.

And finally, in Year 12, we've been moving through our close and critical studies of text, focusing on the themes of a novel or film and discussing the various techniques used by composers to depict stories that matter. As a wonderful end to the term, we invited local award-winning film-maker, Damon Gameau, to speak with our Year 12 students about hope, resiliency, and the work we can all be doing to regenerate our communities and our planet. The presentation and viewing of his latest short documentary - *Regenerating Australia 2030* - took place in the final week of the term and left us all with a sense of both possibility and responsibility. As a school, we could not be more grateful to Damon for his time and generosity in speaking with our seniors and passing on to them a message of ecological aspiration.

The whole English faculty is looking forward to the upcoming mid-winter break (albeit with volumes of essays to mark) and a fresh start to the coming term.





























The support class have had an excellent term and have been out and about in Mullumbimby. They have been studying the history of our town and prepared some posters.


Year 11 have been learning about food and holidaying in Indonesia this term and I couldn't be prouder of the efforts they made in their first senior assessments. Of course, we've also had lots of fun cooking, playing vocabulary games and exploring the Indonesian culture through connecting with our pen pals in Lombok, dress ups and exploring contemporary Indonesian pop culture!

Our Year 10 students will soon be picking their subjects for Year 11, 2023. The Indonesian Beginners course is a highly accessible, engaging and beneficial course for any student. Learning Indonesian is a great way to gain the linguistic and cultural knowledge you need to explore our closest neighbour, gain the intercultural understanding necessary to succeed in any globalised workplace, improve your English literacy skills, improve your memory (it'll help you in all of your subjects), and open the door to unique career and study opportunities. If that wasn't incentive enough, because Improving the relationship with Indonesia is a government priority (you may have seen Australia-Indonesia relations written about a lot in the media over the past two weeks, or seen Penny Wong speaking Indonesian), the Group of 8 Universities offer bonus ATAR points for students studying languages, and Universities now offer fee reductions to students studying languages! Mullumbimby High and Bu Sophie (Miss Mount) have a strong history of students performing exceptionally well in Indonesian with Band 6's being attained in every year for which we have candidates sitting the HSC. 

## **YEAR 10 ARCHIBIMBIES**
























#### Benefits of a UAC application

Applications for 2023 entry opened on 12 April for NSW, ACT and IB students. Applications for interstate students will open on 1 August 2022. We're sometimes asked about the benefits of applying through UAC, so here are a few points:

- \* You can apply for multiple institutions with just one application.
- You can apply for SRS early offers.
- \* If you've experienced educational disadvantage during Years 11 and or 12, you can have that disadvantage considered through EAS.
- \* You can change your preferences as many times as you like.
- \* You can be considered for the most competitive courses, which generally aren't available via direct applications.
- Semester 1, 2023 courses are being added to the UAC application progressively. All courses will be available for selection by 1 August.
- \* To start their application, students will need their Year 12 student number (eg NESA or BSSS student number) and UAC PIN.
- \* **NSW HSC and ACT BSSS students:** Their UAC PIN was emailed to them on 12 April. There's a step-by-step guide in the 'How to start your UAC application' <u>video</u>.



# **E-CIGARETTES AT SCHOOL**

Dear Families,

Recently we have seen an increase in reports that students may be using e-cigarettes (otherwise known as 'vaping') across local schools and in the community. We take this issue seriously due to the negative health effects vaping can have on young people, who are often unaware of the risks associated with the practice.

Vaping is the act of inhaling a vapour produced by an e-cigarette or electronic vaporizer. The vapour can contain nicotine and other substances and may expose users to chemicals and toxins which are harmful to health. The devices are small and can be easily hidden in a pocket or bag. The most popular disposable vapes resemble large USB sticks or highlighter pens.

The vapes pictured can contain 5% nicotine, which is the equivalent of a strong pack of cigarettes. Nicotine is addictive and can harm brain development and impact learning, memory, and attention.

The Public Health (Tobacco) Act 2008 was amended in 2015 to define e-cigarettes and e-cigarette accessories to be separate from tobacco products. The Act makes many of the provisions that apply to tobacco products also apply to e-cigarettes and e-cigarette accessories.

The Act makes it an offence:

- To sell e-cigarettes and e-cigarette accessories to persons aged under 18;
- For adults to buy e-cigarettes and e-cigarette accessories on behalf of persons aged under 18;

The NSW Department of Education has advised schools that students should not bring e-cigarettes or e-cigarette accessories onto school premises or use them during school-based activities.

Consistent with Department of Education and school policy - vaping, selling or being in the possession of ecigarettes will result in disciplinary action that may lead to a student being suspended from school.

We are asking parents to be informed about this ongoing concern and to speak to their children about making positive decisions.

Term two has been a busy and productive time for the school, the students and the P&C. Following impacts and disruptions from Covid 19 and the flood in term 1, it has been reassuring and inspiring to see the work put in by staff to bring the school routine back to a level of normalcy so our children can attend onsite and enjoy and flourish in the school environment. Thank you staff for all your behind the scenes work to make this happen.

For the P&C in term 2 we have had our AGM in week three and an ordinary meeting in week seven. We have submitted grant applications to try and realise our dream to have the four asphalt tennis courts resurfaced so that our students and a broader range of sports clubs in our community can access and enjoy these facilities. We will find out later in the year if this application is successful or if we may need to explore other ways to fundraise for this initiative.

A successful grant we have had in term two was written by P&C Secretary Tom Alletson and secured \$10,000 that will go towards replacing the pianos lost in the flood. Thank you Tom for the work you put into this and we look forward to listening to the music students in the school playing these pianos for many years to come.

There are other grant applications we are exploring and writing at the moment and if you have an interest or time to help with this it would be very welcome. Please feel free to contact the P&C if you are curious.

The P&C were also able to raise over \$40,000 through a fundraising platform on line that we are using to support the school with resources, activities and goods that support the wellbeing of the students. To this ends we have donated several thousand dollars of uniforms to students who lost their uniforms in the flood. We have provided students with vouchers to the canteen to enjoy some of the healthy and nutritious foods on offer there. We have purchased an air hockey table and a soon to arrive foosball table for the students to enjoy in the playground. Through consultation with the students, the staffs continue to identify other activities and outings that we can utilise these funds towards. Thank you to the many people within and outside of our school community that donated to this initiative. Your generosity and kindness are very much appreciated by the P&C, the school and the students in turn.

The P&C wish everyone a safe and relaxing holiday break and look forward to supporting the school to be the best we can in terms 3 and 4.

From your app, go into Settings cog in the top left corner of the dashboard screen, then into App Version. (See image below.)




#### I am on Version 3 or 4

Dear parents, guardians and carers

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- · category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- · formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- · consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. 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To the Northern Rivers community

This week I visited schools in the Northern Rivers to hear from principals, students, parents and teachers. Unfortunately, I was unable to visit every school impacted by the floods, however, the visit enabled me to gain a better understanding of the devastating impact of the floods on school communities.

Due to the unique challenges facing schools, students and families, we have established a Flood Support program, to collect detailed information about the impact of the floods on each student.

This includes specific information about each student, the progress they had made, and the impact on their work.

Our current priority is offering support and advice for performance exams, practical projects and submitted works/projects. We value the suggestions that school executives have proposed and will review these and endeavour to implement where feasible.

NESA is also looking to expand our support for schools in the area, for the benefit of students, teachers and principals.

While I understand it can be very challenging, I encourage students to continue learning, and where practical and safe, working on projects and submitted works and preparing for performance exams.

Motivation can be hard to muster and maintain in times like these but focussing on post-school goals may provide a sense of hope.

I would like to reassure you that we will continue to support schools and ensure there are processes in place to support HSC students.
