ENGLISH FACULTY

It has been a massive term 3 and 4 for our faculty. We've dressed up, decorated doors, coordinated

debates, cried as we farewelled our Yr 12 students, marked essays and stories till our eyes blurred and heads ached (and we'll be doing more of it throughout the school break), and marvelled at the creativity of our students! And when we weren't doing all that, we did our very best to nurture a love of literature in every student in our school.

Wear It Purple Day

This year the English Faculty sadly didn't win the Wear It Purple Day door competition, but we gave it a red-hot go! We created a door highlighting the LGBTQI writers openly and visibly achieving their dreams in literature - over the ages.

This is one of our favourite days of the year, as it gives us an excuse to go over the top in celebrating gender diversity in our school and community. More importantly, we love putting on our larger-than-life displays and inviting students to join us in being creative and sharing their art and stories.

Byron Writers Festival

This year the English excursion to the Secondary Schools Day of the Byron Writers Festival in Bangalow proved to be another exciting and enriching day out. It was a wonderful excursion, and students made the most of the opportunity to spend time listening to stimulating and thought-provoking panel discussions, as well as buying books, meeting authors, and spending time with other like-minded students from a host of high schools from both near and far.









Book Week

Ms McCarthy (the White Rabbit) orchestrated our first proper Book Week in some time, with scavenger hunts, book borrowing competitions and the obligatory dress up day. The English Faculty dressed up as characters from Alice in Wonderland - what a classic! (Yes, pun intended).



Debating Challenge

This term saw students in Years 9 and 10 compete in the Premier's Debating Challenge. Four very special students represented our school in the North Coast Zone and were victorious in two of their debates Unfortunately, Mullumbimby was pipped at the post by Byron High School in the final stage. However, we still finished second in the zone which is a fantastic achievement for all involved.

Year 7 - Indigenous Voices

This term, Year 7 has been exploring the importance of our First Nations Peoples and their voices. They have each selected an Indigenous Person who is important and interesting to them and researched their histories and activism. This research and biography ultimately culminated in Year 7 presenting their findings to the class and educating their peers about the important and amazing Indigenous Voices in our country.

Year 8's Museum of Belonging

In Term 3, Year 8 students have explored the concept of Belonging through a variety of texts in English. These texts represented ideas around belonging and not belonging, and the way this feeling can vary and is shaped by personal, social and cultural contexts. Students considered their own experiences of belonging and the connections they may have made with people, places, groups, communities and the larger world. From this study our students created a visual representation of their understanding and feeling of belonging, their choices, or the barriers that may exist for them. We created a Museum of Belonging to showcase their work and allow



their creative voices to shine. Their pieces are varied and unique and teachers and staff are enormously impressed with their effort and skills. Great work Year 8 students.



Year 9 - Documentary study

This term, students have been studying the codes and conventions of documentaries and the way documentaries shape our understanding of various issues. We analysed documentaries that explored social



issues, considering both the messages contained within them as well as the methods used to engage audiences. We also examined the primary stakeholders in documentary filmmaking, considered the bias evident even in nonfiction texts, and discussed the importance of not believing everything we watch. Students have confidently delivered a presentation analysing a documentary of their choosing to their classmates - there are some fascinating documentaries to be seen!

Year 10 - Discursive feature article writing

This term has challenged Year 10 to both examine texts and their thematic qualities, and to then compose discursive pieces that explore (from their own perspective) the themes evident in those texts. Some classes studied 'Emma' vs 'Clueless' and others explored the text 'The Outsiders'. In all cases, the focus was on looking at how the medium (film or novel) depicted the issues faced by characters. Students then wrote their own discursive articles, exploring a theme of interest to them and articulating their own perspectives and experiences.

Year 11

This final term of Year 11 required students to engage with texts in a deep and considered manner, and to prepare for their final Preliminary exams. Students have worked hard on assessment tasks and in revising modules. Our English Studies students also worked very hard on their portfolios, so much so that Ms Gemma Veriga-White was able to reward their efforts with an excursion to Warner Bros Studios on the Gold Coast to learn about film making as part of their Big Screen module. It's been a big term, and students have earned the next two weeks off before they embark on their final Year 12 studies.

Year 12 - Bon Voyage!

In their last ever term of school, Year 12 has continued to prove how hardworking and diligent they are.

Our Extension 2 students have worked tirelessly to complete their major works and submit them for marking. These projects have been a year in the making so a huge congratulations to all Extension 2 students.

We supported our Yr 12 students in the lead-up to their Trial exams and then marked the several hundred pages worth of work they lovingly generated at said exams for us to mark.

As we neared the end of their time with us at school, we helped them revise all the content of the past year in readiness for their HSC, and then hosted such fun class parties - such a joyful time!

Finally, on the last week of Term 3, the English faculty (together with the CAPA faculty) coordinated the Yr 12 Graduation Ceremony. It was a delightful send-off and many a celebratory tear was shed.







Astoundingly we have come to the end of another year filled with learning and the exploration of new ideas, texts and concepts. Across the grades, everyone has worked hard and is ready to progress into the

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next year of English. Thank you to all of our wonderful students for their dedication and enthusiasm over the year. Have a wonderful holiday break.

Year 7

In Term 4, Year 7 has been exploring the Hero's Journey, a common template of stories that involve a hero who goes on an adventure. Students have learned about film techniques and have applied these techniques to a film. They have also been learning how to write extended responses in preparation for year 8.

Year 8

Year 8 has learned how to do the 'hard sell' through developing excellent persuasive advertising campaigns, selling all kinds of products: existing and made up. Students then had to pitch their ideas to potential investors (the class) in the style of Shark Tank. We have some budding advertising executives in our midst - they were so professional!



Year 9

Year 9 have been delving into the world of crime fiction and have become experts and identifying the codes and conventions of the genre. We have read classic crime fiction extracts and viewed crime fiction films, culminating in a persuasive film review. Elementary Watson!

Murder on the Orient Express


2017 film, by Kenneth Branagh and written by Agatha Christie

Year 12

Congratulations to our cohort of Year 12s who have just completed their first term of their chosen English course. It flies by! Everyone is evolving into the Year 12 mindset of learning, studying and completing assessments. This is commendable considering the rest of the school is winding down for the year, but our 12s must maintain their focus and energy for learning.

The Advanced English group have completed an in-depth analysis of how Arthur Miller's allegorical play, *The Crucible*, explores individual and collective human experiences, whilst comparing and contrasting it to a text of their choosing. This was accompanied by engaging and professional presentations of their findings to the class.

The Standard English classes have been exploring the individual and collective human experience in Favel Parrett's *Past the Shallows* composing an in-depth analytical essay as well as presenting a text of their choosing in a multi-modal presentation to the class.

The English Studies group have also been studying the human experiences portrayed in the beautiful film *Billy Elliot*. They have responded to this text with an analytical essay.



He also got a chance to do a fun picture at the photo booth with teacher Rosie Wild and support staff, Ann Esposito.





Biology Excursion

Year 12 students were lucky enough to see the brewery at Wandana in full swing as it was their brewing day the morning we arrived. The students are studying microbiology and fermentation as one of their first topics for the HSC. During the visit, students learned about the brewing process, from the array of enzymes used to produce the sugars to the different types of yeast used for each type of beer in the fermentation process.

In an Australian first, Wandana uses sound vibrations, ie. different types of music for each type of beer that

increases the fermentation process by up to 30% and adds different flavour profiles. And yes! it's backed up by science.

We would like to thank our expert tour guide Rupert for his time and passion in showing the students the hands-on way to integrate learning with real-world applications, and the importance of sustainability in commercial practices. *Mr Mat Hall*


MEETING WITH OUR JAPANESE FRIENDS FROM TOSHIMA ISLAND


The Most prestigious award from the NSW School Sport Association was presented to Year 12 student Marielou Baudouin.

AGRICULTURE




MATHEMATICS





education activities. In addition, our students are engaged with industry opportunities coordinated by the Regional Industry Education Partnerships program and CONNECT Northern Rivers. VET AMBASSADORS

Week 1 of Term 4 started with the EPP initiative of VET Ambassadors sharing career pathways with Year 9 and Year 10 students. The EPP VET Ambassadors shared their personal experiences and answered questions from students about interest areas, study plans and career goals. The four VET Ambassadors have backgrounds in Retail; Early Childhood Education and Care; Construction; Automotive and Digital Communications and Media.

A highlight was when VET Ambassador, Ammaleah Astruc, recognised a student she had met over three years ago at Mullumbimby High School and was able to follow up on the career pathway of Kaliyah Browning, Year 12 student, who graduated this year, completing a School Based Apprenticeship and Traineeship at Brunswick Heads Public School and attaining the Cert III in School Based Education Support.

EPP START YOUR FUTURE

An EPP initiative with Year 10 students attending an eight-week course at Kingscliff TAFE to explore VET pathways. This term, students have been involved in Bakery, Automotive and Barbering. From this experience over the past year, we have students heading to study an External-VET course at TAFE as part of their senior studies in Aviation, Bakery, Early Childhood Education and Care, Maritime Operations and Electrotechnology. Most of these courses are two years and Year 10 students have needed to finalise their application by end of this term.

roasting marshmallows. Trimester 3 students are now focusing on creating custom fire pit case boxes, learning new practical skills and attention to detail.









