

Call for Scholarship Applicants — LESLEY MCPAUL AM MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

The Lesley McPaul AM Memorial Scholarship will be awarded again in 2024 to commemorate Lesley McPaul's commitment and service to public education for rural children. Lesley's involvement with education in NSW spanned the period from 1970 until the mid-1990s. During this time she undertook many roles, including with the Mullumbimby High School P&C Association. She later became the Country Vice President of the Federation of P&C Associations in NSW where she also served two terms as President between 1986 and 1988. This was the first time a person from country NSW had been elected to this position and it enabled Lesley to give a powerful voice to the needs and challenges of regional and rural education in NSW.

Lesley was appointed by the Premier to the Committee of Review of New South Wales Schools which was led by Sir John Carrick. The recommendations from the Carrick Committee's report, tabled in the NSW Legislative Assembly in November 1989, were encapsulated in the *Education Reform Act 1990*.

From 1989 – 1995, Lesley was an advisor to successive NSW Minister's for Education. Lesley was honoured with a Member of The Order of Australia Award in the 1992 Queen's Birthday Honours List for her services to education and in particular her work with the P&C Federation.

The Lesley McPaul AM Memorial Scholarship is awarded annually to support study of a Higher School Certificate at Mullumbimby High School. You are eligible to apply if you are a Year 10 student with high academic achievement, aged between 15 and 19 years, are recommended by the Principal and intend to continue to Year 12.

Your application will include a 500 word statement addressing:

- what you hope to achieve by completing Year 12
- what your aspirations are (university TAFE, type of job)
- your current community interests, work, or volunteering
- your school representative roles (SRC, sporting, IT competitions) and/or any special circumstances.

Anyone interested in applying for the Scholarship can obtain details and an application form from the Principal.

Applications close end of Week 2 in Term 4.

DIGITAL TECHNOLOGIES

Year 7 Digital Technologies

Our Year 7 students have been immersed in a variety of exciting digital technology projects this term. They've explored microcontrollers, learned about binary code, and even programmed their own games. The highlight of their studies has been creating a robot dance routine using Micro:bits and Maqueen robots. This project has allowed students to apply their coding skills in a fun and creative way, combining technology with music and movement.

Year 9 Computing Technology

The Year 9 Computing Technology class has delved into the world of 3D animation using Blender. Students have acquired skills in 3D modelling, texturing, lighting, and rendering. Their efforts have culminated in creating vaporwave-inspired 3D animations set to music, showcasing their newfound technical abilities and artistic creativity.

Year 9/10 Game Design and Development

Our Year 9/10 Game Design and Development students have been working collaboratively on a major project. Working in small groups, they've been designing their own unique games from the ground up. This term, their hard work has resulted in playable prototypes, revealing a variety of interesting and innovative game concepts.

Year 11 Software Engineering

The Year 11 Software Engineering class has been exploring the fascinating field of Mechatronics. Using Micro:bits, Maqueen robots, and the Python programming language, students have built and programmed line-following and autonomous robots. These impressive machines are equipped with grippers, allowing them to pick up and relocate objects. This hands-on project has provided valuable insights into the integration of software and hardware in engineering applications.

Year 12 Software Design and Development

Our Year 12 Software Design and Development students recently presented their Individual Major Projects, demonstrating impressive skills and innovation. While project themes varied, many students were drawn to game development, showcasing their ability to bring interactive experiences to life. The projects included a diverse range of creations, such as a real-time multiplayer strategy game with network capabilities, a 2D platformer, and a top-down survival game. These examples represent just a few of the many impressive projects developed by our talented students. Each project demonstrated technical proficiency, creativity, and problem-solving abilities.































EXPLORING AEROPONICS

This semester, the Year 7 High Achievers class had the opportunity to explore Agriculture as part of their Science lessons. Mullumbimby High School successfully applied for a loan of an aeroponics kit from the NSW Department of Education, available for use throughout Semester 2. Aeroponics is a method of growing plants where the roots are suspended in air and misted with nutrient solution.

In Term 3, the students researched and selected a diverse range of plants to grow, including lettuce, silverbeet, zucchini, parsley, eggplant, capsicum, peas, passionfruit, and viola. They have been documenting the growth of their plants with photos

and record-keeping on a class Google Site. By Week 9, the seedlings had grown large enough to be transferred to the aeroponics tower, where they will continue to grow until harvest.









YOUNG BUDDING FLORISTS

As part of the Year 10 Agriculture course, students were tasked with creating a flower bouquet as their assessment, following their study of the cut flower industry. Over Terms 2 and 3, the class explored bouquet design and practiced their skills by collecting materials from the school grounds and assembling arrangements during class.

In Week 9, students were provided with a variety of flowers and foliage for their assessment and asked to design a bouquet that captured the essence of 'Spring.' After two periods of hard work, they produced vibrant, colourful arrangements worthy of a florist's praise. Well done, Year 10 Agriculture!









AGRICULTURE AND THE SCHOOL FARM





It has been a very eventful, educational and fun term 3 in Agriculture. Earlier in the term we had the pleasure of a visit from our visiting Japanese students. For some it was their first time holding a rabbit and/or feeding sheep and goats. The smiles on their faces were from ear to ear.

Our 100-hour class enjoyed upskilling their Animal husbandry techniques by learning how to bath and groom our parent rabbits as well as learning some useful building skills through helping fox-proof our Ag farm gates and fences. We have also had some new introductions at the Ag farm with a couple of baby rabbits (kittens) being welcomed into the world in early spring. Our year 10 class has been busy learning to drive our Kybota tractor heading towards getting their school tractor licences.


For our Year 12 students, this term marked the completion of their HSC major projects, and they are now preparing for their final exams. In their final unit of work, they have been focusing on sustainable and ethical choices within the textiles industry. To reinforce these lessons, Year 12 went on their final excursion to the op shops in Byron Bay, where they practiced making sustainable fashion choices. This hands-on experience allowed students to apply their understanding of ethical and eco-friendly fashion as they explored creative ways to reuse and repurpose garments.

In addition, Year 10 and 11 students were fortunate to visit the Gallery of Modern Art (GOMA) in Brisbane, where they experienced the stunning Iris van Herpen exhibition. This immersive showcase featured 130 garments and accessories, paired with contemporary artworks, natural history specimens, and cultural artifacts that inspire van Herpen's groundbreaking designs. Known for creating pieces for the likes of Beyoncé, Björk, and Lady Gaga, van Herpen blends traditional hand-crafting techniques with advanced technologies such as 3D printing, drawing on inspiration from the natural world and science. 

















































CAREERS


EPP START YOUR FUTURE



Furthermore, I commissioned Nickolla Clark, a young Arakwal woman of the Bundjalung nation, who resides in the Byron Shire to paint for us an original piece titled Mulli Mulli Jagun (Small Hill Country) which depicts the Coolamon scenic range sweeping into the grasslands behind Mullumbimby including Chincogan hills. We were presented with our beautiful painting on Monday 23 September and are honoured to display the talent of this First Nations young woman within our school library.

MHS school library is one of the few school libraries in the Northern Rivers that values the importance of paperback and hardcover literature over e-books.

Over the last two years, I have managed to re-stock the library with an abundance of Fiction, Non-Fiction, Teaching Resources, Graphic novels, and Picture books for our students to enjoy.

In addition, I financially supported different faculty areas within the school with the purchase of new textbooks and teaching resources to support the implementation of the new Stage 5 and 6 Syllabus.

Similarly, I was pleased to support one of our local small businesses by sourcing \$3000 worth of literature from our very own little gem, The Mullumbimby Book Shop.

Additionally, In Term 4, the graphic art installation will be installed externally on the western wall of the library. Not only will our library space be beautiful internally but exter-





nally as well. Watch out for more news to come on this initiative. Our library continues to be a popular space amongst Yr 12 students who are forever grateful for their cafe-styled Senior Hub, a specialised area within the library that is designated specifically for them to study privately.

Throughout the Term, the library space has been transformed into a lecture theatre where we have hosted Parent - Teacher evenings, information nights, guest speakers, subject selection interviews for students, and much more.

The weekly Homework Club is growing in popularity operating out of our library every Thursday afternoon between 3pm and 4pm. 


A Thrilling Term for Music at Mullumbimby High School!




CONGRATULATIONS

- 1. Each student is welcomed to make **ONE** entry only per section. Entry is free.
- 2. Entries in the secondary sections <u>close on Tuesday the 22nd of October at 3.00pm</u>. They are to be delivered to the front office of either, Mullumbimby High School, Byron Bay High School or Cape Byron Steiner School. Contact the co-ordinator if alternative arrangements are required.

Late entries will not be accepted. Entries will be returned to each school site after the Expo.

3. There are seven sections for the competition. **There is an amount of \$100** available for judges to award, for each section. Generally it will be awarded as follows: \$50 for 1st prize, \$30 for 2nd prize, \$20 for 3rd prize and Certificates of Commendation. Note: The judges may vary this allocation dependent on the nature and number of entries in each category.

The judges decision will be final. The sections are:

- Water colour/gouache
- Oil/acrylic
- Mixed media
- Print making/drawing/pastels
- Sculpture
- Photography / Digital Art
- 4. Entries should be based on the annual theme. In 2024, the theme is "Myths & Stories."
- 5. Entrants must be currently enrolled at a secondary school in the Brunswick Valley or Byron Shire. Home Schooling students in Byron Shire may also enter.
- 6. Entries should meet the following conditions:

The entry must be clearly labeled on the back with the, Title of Artwork, Section Entered, Artist full name, School and the Year Enrolled at school. The labels MUST be supplied by the artist. Entries will not be accepted if not correctly labeled.

All 2D art work MUST be able to be hung or mounted (using Blu Tack) to a wall. Oils must be dry.

Please note that the maximum size for hanging works is 75 cm x 75 cm. 3D sculptures footprint no larger than 75cm by 75cm. Height 75cm maximum. Must be able to be carried easily by one person.
